Chapter 1:

Tell someone where to find this part of your binder.

Reflection Prompt

"If I could leave only one message behind, what would it be?"

"What do I want people to feel when they gather in my name?"



Chapter 3:

The binder that holds everything

Fear:

“What if I forget something that matters?”

Reframe:

You don't need to remember everything—you just need one place to hold it all.

There is no manual for loss. No checklist handed to you when someone dies. What you get instead is a flood of questions:

Choose the format: Digital folder? Binder? Both?

Create your five tabs or sections

Start filling one item per week. One at a time.
One brave step.

Reflection Prompt

“Who would need to step in if something happened to me - and what would I want them to find?”

Chapter 4:

If something happens to me tomorrow...

Fear:

"What if I'm not there, and no one knows what to do?"

Reframe:

This isn't about control. It's about compassion.

The truth is, we're not invincible. Accidents happen. Illnesses appear uninvited. Emergencies knock on the door when we least expect them. And when they do, someone you love will need to step in and hold the pieces.

What will they find?
A tangle of questions - or a clear path?

This chapter isn't about expecting the worst. It's about protecting the people you love from unnecessary suffering.

It's about clarity over chaos. Calm over confusion. Love over legacy limbo.

Who needs to know what - and when

ICE Contacts

So nothing critical is locked away

Organ Donor Certificate

Gives life, literally

Funeral or Memorial Plan

Brings clarity to those grieving

Who Has the Passwords?

So your phone, laptop, or cloud account doesn't become a locked vault

School / Childcare Emergency Plans

Especially if you have young children

Pet Plan

Who steps in to care for them, immediately and longer-term

Brave Action #4: Your 'In Case' Envelope

Create an Emergency Envelope and label it clearly. Keep it somewhere secure but accessible. Include: One printed page with key ICE contact names and numbers

Copy of medical aid card & ID

Note on where to find the full Brave Binder

Special instructions if you have dependents or pets

Then tell at least two people where to find it.

Talk It Out

The best plan in the world is useless if no one knows it exists.

This is your reminder to start the conversation - with your partner, your children, your best friend, your executor. "If something ever happens to me... here's what you need to know."

Reflection Prompt

"Who would I want to step in for me if I couldn't speak or act for myself?"

"Have I made it easy for them to do that, or hard?"

Chapter 5:

Who holds the keys?

Fear:

"If I give someone access, I'll lose control."

Reframe:

Access isn't about losing power. It's about extending trust—with intention.

There's something deeply vulnerable about handing someone the keys to your life. Whether it's your financials, your passwords, your will, or your children's school info - these aren't just files. They're you. Your world. Your boundaries. Your safety net.

So it makes sense that this part brings up fear.

What if they misuse it?

Types of Access to Consider

General Power of Attorney

Allows someone to act on your behalf, legally, while you're alive and mentally capable

Medical Power of Attorney

Digital Power of Access

Master password, password manager, social media, email, banking logins

Financial Delegation

Someone trusted who can access specific accounts, policies, or properties

Emotional Executor

Someone who understands your family dynamics and can help carry your intentions with care

Choose Your Access People

Ask yourself:

Who do I trust with my finances?

Who could make medical decisions on my behalf?

Who has the emotional intelligence to hold this with grace?

Who knows the practical things - like where I bank or who my vet is?

Tip: It doesn't all have to be one person. Divide and empower.

Brave Action #5: Name Your Keyholders

Complete a "Who Holds What" page in your Brave Binder

Create separate levels of access (e.g. full, partial, emergency only)

Store a printed list in your binder with signature + date

Talk It Out

“Who would I trust to speak for me?”

“How can I make their role clearer, easier, and safer?”



Chapter 6:

Death in the age of passwords

Fear:

“What if no one can access my accounts when I’m gone?”

Reframe:

Securing your digital life is part of securing your legacy.

Once, your life could be sorted in a shoebox: a few papers, a will, a set of house keys.

Now? It’s all encrypted. It’s in the cloud. It’s stored behind facial recognition and 2-step verification. From your banking app to your email, from your digital photo albums to your crypto wallet - your legacy isn’t just physical. It’s digital. Password Vault

LastPass, 1Password, Bitwarden – secure, master-password-based vaults for all your logins

Facebook Legacy Contact

Allows a nominated person to manage your profile after your death

Google Inactive Account Manager

Decide what happens to your Gmail, Drive, Photos if inactive for a set time

Apple Digital Legacy

Add a Legacy Contact in your iPhone settings under “Passwords & Security”

Brave Action #6: Get Your Digital House In Order

Choose a password manager and set it up

Create a **Master Password** and store it in your Brave Binder

Add digital access details to your “Who Holds What” page

Set up at least one legacy contact for a key account (e.g. Facebook or Google)

Reflection Prompt

“What part of my online life would I want preserved?”

“Who do I trust to handle my data with care?”

Optional: Your Digital Afterlife Letter

A short note that says:

“Here’s how to access my digital life. Here’s what matters. Here’s what can be deleted. Here’s what I want you to keep.”

This can be stored in your Brave Binder alongside your Letter of Wishes.

Daily routine, medications, insurance info, emergency contact

Voice Note or Video (optional)

A living memory of your love - spoken in your own words

Values Statement

What mattered most to you, for your children to carry forward

"If You're Reading This..." Letter

For your partner, your child, your sibling, your best friend - your final love note

This Isn't About Control

It's about removing guesswork.
It's about honouring your people.
It's about choosing love over confusion.

Brave Action #7: Write Something

You don't need to write a novel. Start with one note:

- To your child
- To your partner
- To your pet's future carer
- To your best friend
- To yourself

Write the first line. Let your heart take it from there. "If you're reading this, I want you to know..." Store it in your Brave Binder under Letters.



Reflection Prompt

“Who needs my words more than my money?”
“If I could leave behind one piece of guidance,
what would it be?”

Chapter 8:

How to keep it beautifully updated

Fear:

“What if I do all this work and then it’s out of date in a year?”

Reframe:

Your legacy isn’t a one-time act - it’s an ongoing relationship with your life.

Add a recurring calendar event titled: Brave Binder Check-In

Store the link to your digital binder in a secure folder or app

Add one reminder email to your future self (via FutureMe.org or similar)

Reflection Prompt

“What does it look like to live a life that's in order?”
“What would it feel like to know everything important is held, clearly and intentionally?”
