

Rural, Remote and Northern Community Health Centres of Ontario

Community Health Centres (CHCs) deliver primary care services alongside health promotion, chronic disease prevention and management, and community development programs as part of their model of comprehensive primary health care.



On average, patients/clients in RRN communities have an expected need for primary care that is **60% greater** than the average person in Ontario.

29 of Alliance CHC members are located in and serve rural, remote, and northern (RRN) communities.

People living in Ontario's RRN communities experience poorer health outcomes and more complex health issues than those living in urban communities. People living in RRN communities can face unique barriers (e.g., geographic and transportation barriers) to accessing primary care. Team-based care helps provide support for complex and medical care needs.

Our members provide preventative and supportive care for a broad range of clinical, social, and material needs. Some members also offer these programs and services in French.





Cancer screening completion rates in 2024



Social Prescribing

Many RRN centres offer social prescribing to connect clients to non-clinical programs or services that address the social determinants of health and support their overall health and wellbeing.

Social prescribing may be done by link workers, health promoters, Community development workers, and other staff within the interprofessional team.
