

Breast Cancer Fact Sheet



1 in 8 women in the U.S. will be diagnosed with **breast cancer** in their lifetime.

IN THE UNITED STATES

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the U.S., accounting for 32% of newly diagnosed cancers

About every 2 minutes, 1 case of breast cancer is diagnosed in the U.S.

In 2026, about 322,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in women in the U.S. and 2,670 cases are expected in men.

In 2026, nearly 43,000 women and men in the U.S. are expected to die from breast cancer.

Improvements in early detection and treatment contributed to a 44% decline in the breast cancer death rate in the U.S. between 1989-2023.

Breast cancer mortality is about 40% higher in Black women in the U.S. than in white women.

It's estimated there were about 170,000 women living with metastatic breast cancer in the U.S. in 2020 (most recent data available).

There are more than 4 million breast cancer survivors, breast cancer patients and those living with MBC in the U.S.

AROUND THE WORLD

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women around the world, with an estimated more than **2 million new cases** recorded in 2022.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer death among women in most countries in the world.

About every 48 seconds, somewhere in the world, someone dies from breast cancer. That's more than 1,800 women and men every day.

There were more than 7.5 million breast cancer survivors in the world in 2022 (most recent data available).
