The Southern Historical Association (SHA) was organized on November 2, 1934 and charged with promoting an "investigative rather than a memorial approach" to southern history. The Association seeks to: 1) support history education in the American South; 2) promote the study and teaching of Southern history at all educational levels; 3) encourage the collection and preservation of historical records within the American South; and 4) support and encourage state and local historical societies, museums, and educational organizations within the American South. We represent all historians of the South and all history educators in the South. The Association holds an annual meeting, usually in the first or second week of November, and publishes the quarterly *Journal of Southern History*.

The SHA aims to be an inclusive organization and strives to treat all members with dignity and respect and to provide a community that is free from discrimination, whether based on race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, marital status, or any other status or classification protected by federal, state, or local law.

# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



## Welcome to St. Pete Beach, FL

Dear Conference Participants,

I am honored and grateful to serve as President of the Southern Historical Association and welcome you to our 91st annual meeting at the TradeWinds Resort in St. Pete Beach, Florida, November 5-8, 2025!

I know that Florida might not feel like a welcoming or even a safe place to visit because of recently passed state laws targeting academia and history educators and the dignity and safety of visitors and residents. I hope longstanding SHA members and newcomers, whether they can attend or not, will see that some Florida legislators may not want us but Florida needs us: to practice our craft; to share and expand our ideas; to affirm our commitments to inclusive historical inquiry and intellectual freedom; and to build our community of scholars, teachers, public historians, museum professionals, and all practitioners of southern history in all its many dimensions.

The program theme, “History and Its Stakeholders, Past and Present,” meets the distressing challenges of practicing history in Florida and, for that matter, in our nation. Program Committee Chairs Kirsten Wood

and Andrew Frank and committee members created an inclusive, capacious, relevant, and inspiring set of panels.

The opening plenary will focus on the fight to preserve native ground in Florida. At that plenary we will also honor Randal Hall, who this year is stepping down from his exemplary editorship of the *Journal of Southern History*. If you have published in or read the *JSH* in the last 22 years, you are indebted to Randal, who served as Associate Editor (2003-2006), Managing Editor (2006-2013), and Editor (2013-2025).

The larger conference program reflects the SHA’s longstanding partnerships with several other organizations, including the Southern Association for Women Historians, the Latin American and Caribbean Section, the European Section, the Society of Civil War Historians, the Southern Conference on British Studies, and the Southern Labor Studies Association. Through their sessions and community-building efforts, we can all learn from one another, including across traditional geographic boundaries. This year we are using the presidential reception—which will be earlier than usual—to bring together all affiliate organizations. So, mark your calendars for November 5 @ 5:45 PM in the Garden Courtyard.

Jennifer Ritterhouse, chair of the Committee on Teaching, and members of that new and thriving committee fostered partnership with Florida-based K-12 educators and built a track of sessions centered on our colleagues in public and private secondary schools. But it seems to me, we all, regardless of our institution or job requirements, are educators, so whoever and however you teach, attend a session hosted by the Committee on Teaching!

Our always lively and welcoming receptions are possible because of the fundraising and organizing efforts of members of the Local Arrangements Committee, led by Evan Bennett. When you enjoy the plenaries and receptions or social events, thank Evan and his team and our generous sponsors!



## STATEMENT ON INCLUSIVENESS

The Southern Historical Association (“SHA” or the “Association”) is committed to being an inclusive, diverse, and equitable organization. The SHA strives to treat all its members with dignity and respect and strives to provide a community that is free from discrimination and harassment in all respects, whether based on race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, marital status, or any other status or classification protected by federal, state, or local law.

## CODE OF CONDUCT

The Southern Historical Association (“SHA” or the “Association”) strongly opposes discrimination and harassment in all aspects of academia. Further, the Association encourages informational activities designed to promote the education of its members and the public regarding discrimination and harassment and encourages historians to speak out against such incidents. Simultaneously, the Association opposes efforts to limit academic discourse and free speech on campuses, and it disapproves of the violation of academic freedom. Discrimination and harassment within academe are unethical, unprofessional, and constitute a threat to academic freedom.

### Purpose

The purpose of this Code of Professional Conduct is to ensure a safe, welcoming, and inclusive environment, free of discrimination and harassment, for all members and participants during the SHA’s annual meeting (whether at an official or unofficial event or activity), in traveling to and from the annual meeting, during a SHA committee meeting, or in connection with performing committee or other official work for the SHA committee work (whether in-person, by telephone, or through electronic communication), all such events and activities referred to collectively herein as the “SHA Events and Activities”.

To that end, the SHA strictly prohibits discrimination and harassment against members and participants at all SHA Events and Activities, whether based on race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, marital status, or any other status or classification protected by federal, state, or local law.

Any form of discrimination or harassment based on any status or classification protected by federal, state, or local law at SHA Events and Activities is a serious violation of this Code of Professional Conduct and undermines the

atmosphere of trust essential to the academic environment. It is unacceptable to condone discrimination or harassment or to disregard complaints of discrimination or harassment. Such actions or inactions may allow or promote a hostile environment and are inconsistent with the maintenance of academic freedom.

Simultaneously, the SHA recognizes that among historians and scholars who study and discuss difficult topics, there may be times when the display of offensive materials and the discussion of negative and even denigrating stereotypes and labels is reasonable for honest scholarly conversation.

Additionally, the SHA requires all members and participants, including attendees, staff, contractors, temporary staff, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, employees, volunteers, and guests, to engage in respectful behavior and to preserve the Association’s standard of professionalism at all times at SHA Events and Activities.

### Expected Behavior

- All participants are expected to comply with this Code of Professional Conduct at all SHA Events and Activities.
- All participants are expected to abide by the norms of professional respect that are necessary to promote the conditions for free academic interchange.
- If any participant witnesses or is subjected to a potential violation of this Code of Professional Conduct, the participant must immediately report the conduct as directed under this Code in the Complaint Process below.
- If any participant witnesses or is subjected to a situation in which someone may be in imminent physical danger, the participant must immediately alert staff, security personnel, or law enforcement, as appropriate.

### Examples of Unacceptable Behavior

These examples are not intended to be exhaustive.

#### Sexual Harrassment

Unacceptable behavior includes any form of sexual harassment, and the SHA opposes sexual harassment in any setting. Sexual harassment of members or other participants at SHA Events and Activities is strictly prohibited under this Code of Professional Conduct. Sexual harassment includes behavior that demeans, humiliates, or threatens an individual on the basis of that individual’s sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation. In the academic context, the term “sexual harassment” may be used to describe a wide range of behaviors.

Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- Gender-based or sexist remarks or behavior
- Intentionally misgendering someone or refusing to use a person's preferred pronouns
- Sexual advances linked to reward or accompanied by threat of professional harm or other forms of retaliation
- Persistent and unwelcome solicitation of emotional or physical intimacy
- Sexual assault

### Other Forms of Harassment and Discrimination

Harassment and discrimination on the basis of any protected characteristic are also strictly prohibited under this Code of Professional Conduct. Harassment includes inappropriate, discriminatory, or harassing comments or actions based on race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, marital status, and/or any other status or classification protected by federal, state or local law.

Examples may include, but are not limited to:

- Epithets, slurs, or negative stereotyping based on any protected status or classification
- Denigrating jokes and display or circulation of written or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual or group based on a protected status or classification
- Behavior that demeans, humiliates, or threatens an individual on the basis of any protected status or classification

### Retaliation

Retaliation, retribution, or reprisal against any individual who in good faith reports any potential or actual violation of this Code of Professional Conduct or who assists or participates in any investigation under this Code of Professional Conduct is strictly prohibited. Any such retaliation constitutes a serious violation of this Code of Professional Conduct and will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action. Any person who witnesses or is subjected to retaliation must immediately report that conduct as directed under this Code of Professional Conduct.

## COMPLAINT PROCESS

Any participant covered by this Code of Professional Conduct who believes he or she has witnessed or been subjected to any violation of this Code of Professional Conduct should immediately report the conduct:

- via the web intake portal (<http://thesha.ethicspoint.com>);
- via the mobile intake portal (<http://theshamobile.ethicspoint.com>);
- via phone at (833) 254-2098.

The complaint intake process is handled anonymously and independently via the incident management service NAVEX. All complaints will be taken seriously.

Upon receipt of a complaint under the Code of Professional Conduct, the SHA Professional Conduct Committee or the Committee's designee will conduct a prompt, thorough investigation of the complaint as appropriate. Any member of the Professional Conduct Committee who believes they have a conflict of interest will not participate in the investigation process. Depending on the circumstances, the Professional Conduct Committee may engage an outside investigator or counsel to conduct an investigation on its behalf as the Committee deems appropriate. Following investigation, the Professional Conduct Committee will refer its findings to the Executive Committee or the Executive Council.

Every reasonable effort will be made to keep all matters related to the complaint and the investigation confidential, and investigations will be designed to protect the privacy of the parties concerned to the extent reasonably possible.

### Disciplinary Action

Individuals who violate this Code of Professional Conduct will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action by the Executive Committee or the Executive Council, as will individuals who make complaints under this Code in bad faith. Appropriate disciplinary action may include, but is not limited to, a verbal or written warning, censure, ejection from the annual meeting without refund of any applicable registration fees or costs, being banned from participating in future SHA Events and Activities, or expulsion from the membership in the Association.

### Appeals

In the event that an individual is dissatisfied with any action taken as a result of the investigation, that individual may submit an appeal to the SHA's Executive Council within thirty (30) days following the action. An appeal may be granted in the discretion of the Executive Council.

## CALL FOR PAPERS

The 2026 Program Committee invites proposals for the best work in southern history and by historians of the South across a range of topics and time periods. We welcome submissions from long-term members and first-timers, college professors, graduate students, independent scholars, museum professionals, public history practitioners, and K-12 teachers. The 2026 annual meeting will be in Atlanta. With its rich history, dynamic arts scene, and role as a transportation and business hub, Atlanta continues to shape the American South and beyond. The program committee hopes the city's vibrancy and accessibility will encourage historians from both near and far to submit proposals for the conference.

In recognition of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, some of the programming for the 2026 conference will center on telling a fuller history of the American Revolution and its many legacies. Participants are welcome to tie their work to this theme but are not required or expected to do so.

The program committee looks forward to reviewing proposals for traditional panels and roundtables, as well as sessions on the state-of-the-field, significant intellectual and book anniversaries, pedagogy, public history, and professional development. The proposal deadline follows the 2025 conference in St. Pete Beach, and we encourage attendees to treat panels, the "Public Square," the First Time Attendees Reception, and other events this fall as opportunities to generate ideas and network to create sessions for next year's conference.

For any multi-person submission, one member acts as the organizer, who submits a session overview of no more than 250 words, brief abstracts/descriptions for each contribution, and the participants' vitas or resumes.

\* Traditional panels are composed of three 15-minute papers, a chair, and one commentator.

\* Traditional roundtables are coordinated discussions that include three to four discussants and a moderator, who responds and asks questions of the participants. The moderator asks discussants questions while leaving ample time for audience questions. Moderators and chairs are responsible for ensuring that speakers keep within their time limits.

\* Single paper submissions are accepted and, where possible, will be matched into panels by the Program Committee.

\* All proposals for the 2026 program must be submitted online before December 5, 2025. See [thesha.org/submit-a-proposal](https://thesha.org/submit-a-proposal).

# LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS MESSAGE

## WELCOME TO ST. PETE BEACH!

The Local Arrangements Committee, whose members hail from one end of Florida to the other, offer you the warmest welcome to the Sunshine State, to the beautiful city of St. Pete Beach, and to the 91st Meeting of the Southern Historical Association! A year after being battered by Hurricane Helene's storm surge and Hurricane Milton's winds last year, the Tampa Bay Area has rebounded and is ready for you.

The Tampa Bay region is one of the fastest growing in the nation. But it has a long history stretching back into ancient times. Indigenous people settled in the area more than 12,000 years ago when this part of Florida was still a hundred miles or more from the Gulf Coast. Over the millennia, the lives of the descendants evolved as sea levels rose and Florida became warmer and wetter. By the fifteenth century, the Safety Harbor cultural complex – named for excavations at the Tocobaga town site about 20 miles north of St. Pete Beach on Tampa Bay – was dominant in the area. Two major Spanish expeditions began in the area. Pánfilo Narváez and his more famous countryman Álvaro Núñez Cabeza de Vaca landed in 1528 near today's Jungle Prada Site (about 4 miles from the hotel) before moving north to Tocobaga and disaster in north Florida. The mounds built at Jungle Prada and Tocobaga are still visible and accessible, the latter in Phillippe Park. Hernando de Soto followed in 1539, landing on the eastern shore of Tampa Bay, where he did much damage before moving on his ill-fated mission.

The Spanish colonial footprint was relatively light in the Tampa Bay area, but by the early eighteenth century, most Native societies in the region had dispersed or collapsed. From the south came Cuban fishers who built ranchos along the Gulf Coast and inside Tampa Bay for supplying Havana with mullet roe and salted fish. From the north came Creeks, Seminoles, and Miccosukees, first as seasonal hunters and then as town builders. Maroons from the American colonies to the north joined them along the Manatee River at a place called Angola, near modern day Bradenton. A decade of warfare and American expansion after the War of 1812 uprooted Angola and Native settlers in the area.

The establishment of Fort Brooke in what is today downtown Tampa in 1823 solidified U.S. control of Tampa Bay Area. During the Second Seminole War (1835-1842), Fort Brooke became the prison camp for thousands of Seminoles and other Native peoples before their forced exile to Indian Territory. For those loaded onto steamships, the lower Pinellas Peninsula where we are meeting was their last sight of Florida. A little more than a decade later, Seminoles under Billy Bowlegs got their last view of Florida from Egmont Key at the mouth of Tampa Bay, where they were held before sailing to New Orleans. The site remains accessible by boat.

The Civil War only lightly touched the region, the most important actions taken by the U.S. Navy in its destruction of salt works on Tampa Bay. It was only with the arrival of railroads in the 1880s that the region grew. Henry Plant's railroad spurred growth on the Tampa side of the bay. It made possible the development of the cigar industry in Ybor City and West Tampa and the phosphate industry east of Tampa in Florida's Bone Valley. On the St. Petersburg side, tourism became the leading industry. By the 1920s, during the height of the Land Boom, the Million Dollar Pier (located where the St. Pete Pier is today) was the hopping place to be when not at the beach. As in other southern places, Jim Crow ruled the Tampa Bay Area in these years. Policy and custom alike sought to hem in Black folks and deny them access to public places and public life. But all around the bay, Black residents built communities, churches, and schools, and from them challenged Jim Crow.

World War II opened floodgates for people moving to Florida and the Tampa Bay Area. The area was home to several military installations and many soldiers trained here on St. Pete Beach. With sand in their shoes, they came back to Florida and built the region up. Since the 1950s, growth has been the watchword, bringing both good and ill. In the 1950s and 1960s, civil rights activists challenged segregation and, with changes in federal policy and law, upended the most obvious symbols of discrimination. It remains, as elsewhere, an unfinished struggle. In the 1970s, the environmental movement found a vital home in the Tampa Bay Area, where the ecological decline of Tampa Bay spurred greater concern for the natural world. Over the past half century, the region's environment has improved in some ways, but it remains a balancing act.

Those interested in diving deeper into the history of area are encouraged to join one of the tours the committee has arranged. One is a boat tour of the St. Petersburg area offered by the St. Petersburg Museum of History and Tampa Bay Watch, an environmental steward of the bay. Another is a walking tour of nearby Gulfport with local journalist and graduate of the University of South Florida's Florida Studies program Cathy Salustri. Participants will learn about the connections of people and water, and maybe a bit about rumrunning, in this little jewel on Boca Ciega Bay at the tip of Pinellas County. Finally, Raymond Arsenault, the John Hope Franklin Professor of Southern History Emeritus at the University of South Florida, St. Petersburg, will be offering a tour focused on the Black history of St. Petersburg. Attendees will learn from his more than forty years of working in the community. In addition to the tours, there are several museums dedicated to the region's history, including the St. Petersburg Museum of History at the St. Pete Pier and the Tampa Bay History Center in downtown Tampa.

We hope you have a great conference and a great time in St. Pete Beach!

From the Civil War to drug running to arts colony, there's more to this small seaside city than meets the eye. Florida historian Cathy Salustri will lead this walk, which lasts roughly 90 minutes and covers about one mile. The tour is free, but folks are expected to make their own way to the 'trail head' in front of The Gabber Newspaper (2908-B Beach Blvd. S.) via Uber or carpool.

**Black History Trolley Tour** (Friday, November 7 @ 8:30a): This tour will begin in the hotel lobby and proceed via the trolley system, led by Ray Arsenault, John Hope Franklin Professor of Southern History at the University of South Florida. The full tour is expected to take two hours and will return everyone to the hotel about 11a. There is no fee.
